Jurnal Ekonomi dan Bisnis Islam (JEBIS) has come to its 6th volume since the first issue in the mid of 2015. From the beginning, the entire JEBIS team and authors always tried to give their best by providing original scripts that focused on Islamic economics, including research reports, case reports, application of theory, critical studies, and literature reviews. The incoming article has been reviewed by a minimum of two reviewers that ultimately will be selected by the editor in chief in a forum of the editorial board meeting. In addition, maintaining the quality and originality of the article is also carried out with a plagiarism test using Turnitin software.

So far, JEBIS has achieved a good number of visitors. At the beginning of the 6th volume publication on June 30, 2020, the number of page views reached 803 with 86 visitors. For the average, the daily visitor in the Open Journal System is 58.4 per day, while the page view is 264.4 per day. The number is vital to broadening the scope of JEBIS readers. Therefore, each article published in JEBIS will bring a higher impact on the progress of the development of Islamic economics, particularly within the area of developing economies.

This edition brings contemporary topics that are widely discussed among researchers and academics related to Islamic Economics, namely Islamic finance and capital market; Islamic banking; management of Islamic business, entrepreneurship, and tourism; Islamic financial institution non-bank; Islamic risk management and sharia insurance; and Islamic social fund. Specifically, each topic analyzes the impact of the international index on Indonesian Sharia Stock Index; country risk and macroeconomic on Jakarta Islamic Index; sharia innovation strategic and efficiency on the sustainable ability of sharia bank; tourism image, service quality, and promotion on religious tourism interest; macroeconomy on Indonesia's international trade; risk effect on contribution of participants in sharia insurance; religiosity and trust on the intention to pay zakat, *infaq*, and endowments; and the challenge and development of *waqf* and legacy altruism.

Therefore, the contribution of academics, practitioners, and researchers is needed to achieve this.
